



From The Apostle's Heart

Beloved in Christ,

There are moments in life that change everything—moments when God reveals Himself so powerfully that you can never go back to who you were before. This month, I want to share one of those moments with you, a testimony that shaped my ministry and my understanding of the most critical choice every person must make.

I am reminded of the moment I truly recognized who God was in my life—the moment I chose life over death, God over the fleeting promises of this world. It wasn't a grand epiphany with parting clouds or angelic choirs. It was subtle yet undeniable, like a whisper of truth that shifts everything.

The moment began at a religious conference in Connecticut. I went reluctantly, more out of support for my wife than any personal desire to be there. She had been invited to lead praise and worship, and I wanted to stand by her, though my heart wasn't in it. I found a seat in the back and planted myself there, arms crossed, legs aching, glaring at my surroundings.

I didn't stand, didn't clap, and didn't engage. I just counted the minutes until it was over.

Finally, the service drew to a close. It was time for the altar call and a seed offering. The speaker explained that this offering would be sown into the Kingdom, a gesture of faith and trust in God to bless and fulfill the petitions on our hearts. My wife, ever the faithful sower, looked at me with eyes brimming with hope and expectancy—eyes that seemed to hold every possibility of the universe.

"What can we sow?" she asked softly. "What did you hear?"

I hadn't heard anything. I'd been sitting there, disengaged, waiting for the clock to run out. But I gave my wife the number the speaker had mentioned, \$200.

"Here," I said, reaching for my wallet. "Go on up there and sow your seed."



But my wife stopped me. "No," she said. "We have to go together."

Her insistence surprised me. "Since when?" I asked. "You always go up on your own."

"Yes," she replied. "But not today."

Reluctantly, I stood, my legs protesting from being seated so long. We walked to the front together, and I couldn't help but feel out of place. The speaker took our hands, placing them together, then wrapped her own hands around ours.

What followed left me stunned.

She began to speak, describing a conversation my wife and I had had not even 24 hours earlier about refinancing our recently purchased home. She spoke in vivid detail about the layout of our home, its features, and the questions we had been grappling with. Then she said words that pierced my skepticism and doubt:

"The Lord says, go and refinance. You will get approved, and it will be so."

There was no way she could have known these things. No one else knew the details she spoke of, let alone our private discussion. It wasn't theatrics or manipulation—it was the undeniable power of God making Himself known in that moment.

I left that altar forever changed. There were no bells, parting skies, or heavenly fanfare, but something within me had shifted. For the first time, I truly knew that God was real. And if He was real, so was the enemy and his agenda. I wanted no part of the darkness I had been ignoring or minimizing.

That day, I stepped onto the narrow way, determined to follow the One who had revealed Himself so subtle but powerfully.



Scripture Feature

"Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it." - Matthew 7:13-14

In this powerful passage, Jesus speaks of two gates: the wide gate that leads to destruction and the narrow gate that leads to life. This imagery paints a vivid picture of the reality that everyone must choose. This choice not only defines their present but also determines their eternity.

The Wide Gate: Appealing but Deadly

The wide gate, with its allure, is definitely tempting. It is a path of least resistance, offering comfort, indulgence, and the world's pleasures. It requires no sacrifice, no discipline, and no accountability. Those who flock to this gate testify to its appeal; it aligns perfectly with society's norms and cultural values.

Characteristics of the Wide Gate:

Ease: It requires no effort or discipline, making it the default choice for many

Popularity: Many choose this path, drawn by the appeal of following the crowd

Deception: The wide path hides its true nature—while it may look enticing and safe, its end is spiritual destruction

Proverbs 14:12 warns: "There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death."

The Narrow Gate: Challenging but Life-Giving

In contrast, the narrow gate is less inviting at first glance. It is challenging, requiring intentionality and commitment. It demands faith in the unseen, obedience to God's will, and perseverance through trials. Few choose this gate because it goes against the grain, asking for sacrifice in a world that glorifies self-gratification.

Yet, its rewards far outweigh its difficulties. The narrow gate leads to life—life abundant and eternal. Those who walk this path find not only the promise of heaven but the richness of walking in step with their Creator, experiencing His peace, joy, and purpose even during life's challenges.

Characteristics of the Narrow Gate:

Discipline: Walking through requires faith, self-control, and willingness to deny oneself

Rarity: Few choose this path, as it means standing out and often standing alone

Reward: Though the journey is challenging, it leads to intimacy with God and eternal life

Jesus said in Luke 9:23: "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me."

The Power of Free Will

Looking back on my Connecticut experience, I realized that moment was more than a change in circumstances—it was a reflection of free will and my responsibility to choose God over the distractions of this world.

God created us in His infinite love. However, Adam's fall from obedience opened his eyes to the knowledge of good and evil, thus creating free will—the ability to make choices. This freedom is both a gift and a responsibility. It allows us to express our love and trust in God through obedience, but it also means we bear the consequences of our decisions.

Key Truths About Free Will:

1. It Reflects God's Character

Made in God's image, we are given the capacity to choose, mirroring His sovereignty. Our choices reflect what we value and who we trust.

2. It Requires Accountability

With great freedom comes great responsibility. Galatians 6:7 reminds us, "Do not be deceived: God cannot be mocked. A man reaps what he sows."

3. It Reveals Our Heart

Our decisions demonstrate the state of our heart—whether it is surrendered to God or swayed by worldly desires.
